Message from the CEO - Janice Barr

A New Housing Partnership

CLS has been actively developing partnerships with housing providers to facilitate access to affordable housing (Persons with Disabilities (PWD) shelter rates) for the people we support. Often the people we support want to live independently with support from CLS, but housing affordability is the barrier to realizing this choice. Our housing partnerships remove this barrier and help people realize their dreams.

We are pleased to report that we have once again expanded our partnership with the Community Land Trust (CLT). The CLT has awarded CLS 3 units (one wheelchair accessible) in a new building (referred to as McHardy) in Vancouver. The Independent Living Program is in the process of interviewing applicants to live in these new units.

Theater Project

The UBC Centre for Inclusion and Citizenship, The Massey Theatre and 16 co-creators from CLS have again partnered to create a play to help bring awareness to the experiences and barriers people with disabilities often encounter in their lives. Following two very successful and well received productions, *Romance, Relationships and Rights*, and *We Deserve to Work*, the theatre company and its partners performed their third production, *We All Need a Home* June 4, 5, and 6, 2026 at the Massrey Theatre.

This production highlighted the challenges people with disabilities encounter when looking for housing. These challenges may be due to accessibility issues, affordability or simply availability of housing. As they developed the play, many of the co-creators drew from their own lived experiences in finding appropriate housing.

The opening night included an Inclusive Housing Showcase with several housing providers showcasing their work prior to the performance. Shane Simpson, Chair of the CLBC Board of Directors and former Minister for Social Development and Poverty Reduction opened the evening. Following the performance, CLS hosted a reception.

Employee Conference

For the second year, CLS will be hosting an employee conference on June 9th. We expect that 350 to 400 CLS employees to attend. The conference includes:

- An introduction to CLS's Practice Framework - a framework that guides the work we do and shows how we empower every person with dignity and respect to stay in control of their lives.
- Active Support workshop - building on our current knowledge of Active Support this session will apply our current learnings in an interactive, in depth session.
- Communication - this overview session will introduce the various types of augmentative/alternative communication (AAC) available.

A Real Community

Three individuals from the CLS Independent Living Program - Ryan, Chris, and Byron - are active and valued members of the Chelsea Buchannon–East community. Ryan and Byron moved into Chelsea Buchannon–East in mid-2022, followed by Chris in mid-2023. Ryan serves as the main host for many of the building's activities, with Chris and Byron providing ongoing support. Together, they regularly volunteer to help with the building's needs, including decorating both buildings each year for the Christmas season, welcoming new residents, and participating in every Tuesday morning coffee conversation. They are also planning summer activities, including a neighbourhood picnic, to continue strengthening community connections. All three of them are known for their kindness and willingness to help their senior neighbours, whether it is assisting with garbage disposal or helping carry appliances within their apartments.

Byron continues to work at Mountain Equipment Company, where he has built a long career of over 27 years. He lives independently at Chelsea Buchannon–East and is very active as the chairperson of the CLS Self-Advocates Committee, and a member of the CLS Board of Directors. Byron also plays an important role in fostering community in the building, helping host weekly coffee conversations and building meaningful relationships with neighbours. Through one of these connections, he met a UBC teacher living in the building who later offered to help him receive new dentures as part of a teaching opportunity, which he was very grateful for.

All three men help to create a friendly, supportive, and inclusive community every day.

A Social Media Star!

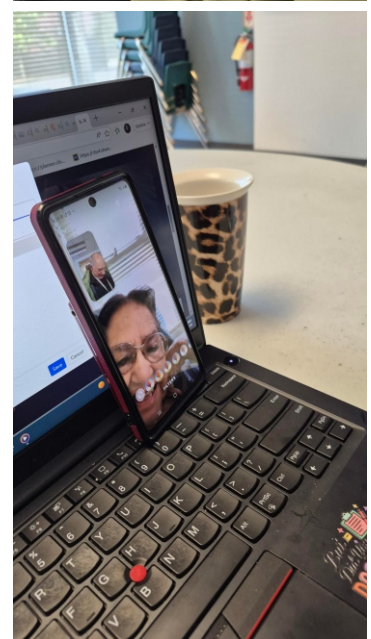
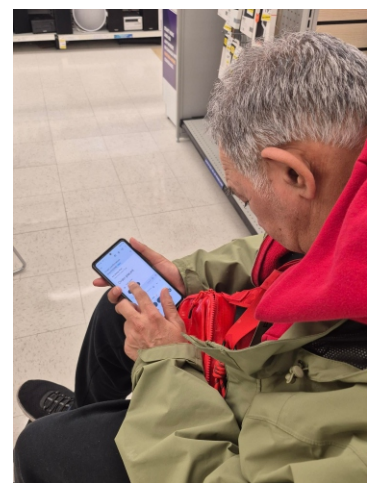
Over the past few months, Vinny has been developing his social media presence, which has supported him in strengthening relationships with his family and reconnecting with old friends. It has also helped him build a positive social identity through sharing content related to adaptive fitness, including his interest in exercise and strength training.

Through platforms such as TikTok and Instagram, Vinny has been able to share highlights of his activities and connect with others in meaningful ways, supporting engagement in conversation when meeting people in the community. He has made several positive connections as a result of his online presence, which has encouraged further social interaction in everyday settings.

Vinny's use of social media has also supported communication with his family. His mother, who is 95, recently joined Instagram and TikTok to stay connected and follow his updates. As Vinny does not always use verbal communication, social media and video calling have become valuable tools for maintaining regular contact, with video calls with his mother becoming an important and enjoyable part of his routine.

Vinny has also created business cards featuring his social media handles, which he shares within the community. He has been engaging positively with local contacts, including HandyDART drivers and community members, who are familiar with his online presence. His younger brother often jokes about him being an “influencer,” reflecting the visibility he has developed in his personal network.

Overall, Vinny's growing online presence has supported both communication and community connection and continues to be a meaningful part of his social engagement and self-expression.

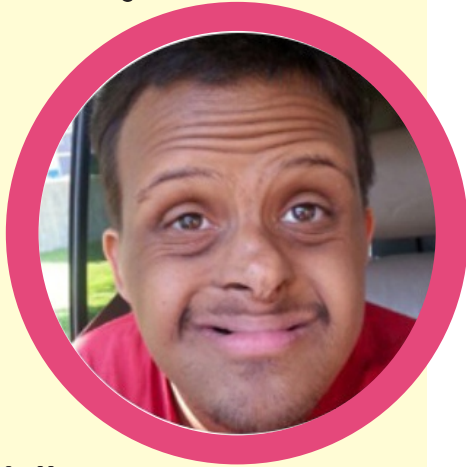

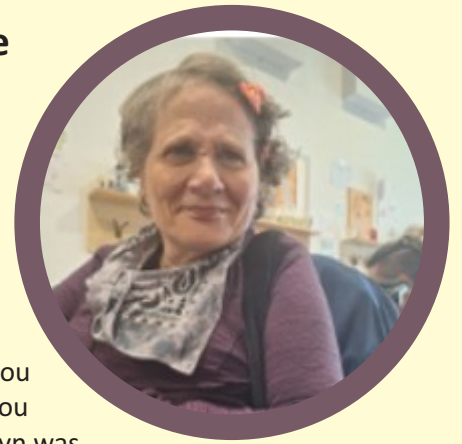
Hosen communicated in his own way. He enjoyed having conversations using sounds. Clapping, rocking back and forth, and smiling.

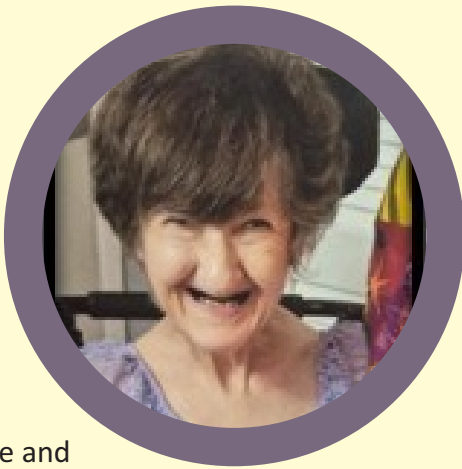

Lorne Krauss

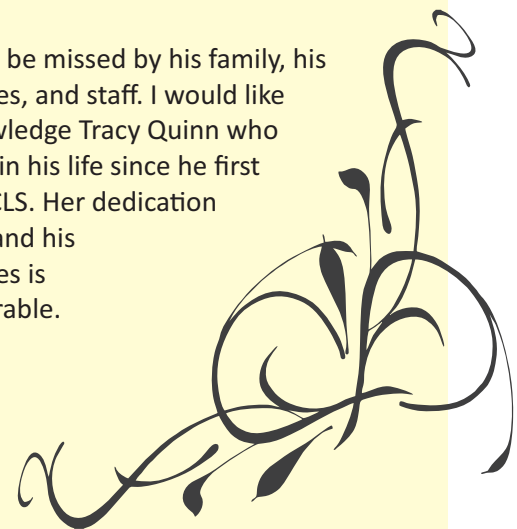
April 15, 1964 - March 6, 2026

He enjoyed spending time with his roommates, in his own way. When his brothers visited him, they would bring instruments and have sing-alongs for Lorne and his roommates. Everyone seemed to enjoy this, but especially Lorne.

Lorne will be missed by his family, his roommates, and staff. I would like to acknowledge Tracy Quinn who has been in his life since he first came to CLS. Her dedication to Lorne and his roommates is immeasurable.



A New Chapter for Terry

Terry's journey toward a richer, more connected life began when CLS was approached by CLBC to provide one-to-one individualized support. For many years, Terry had been living in a long-term care facility where his quality of life was very low. Due to the nature of his disabilities, he experienced profound isolation—he is both deaf and blind, and communication with others around him was extremely limited.

Born deaf, Terry communicates using tactile ASL. After recently losing his vision, he relies on placing his hands over the hands of the person signing to feel each word being communicated. Without consistent, skilled support, meaningful connection in his daily life was difficult.

His opportunities to leave home were rare—often only once a month when his brother, Bill, was able to travel to visit him. Terry required full support to safely access both his home and the wider community. Life had become quiet, limited, and disconnected. That began to change when CLS stepped in.

With the addition of the Individualized Supports program—and in particular, the dedication of his one-to-one support worker, Roberto—Terry's world started to open up in remarkable ways.

For many years, Terry held onto a simple but meaningful dream: to go to White Spot and enjoy his favourite meal. It was something he had long wanted but never had the opportunity to do. Recently, that dream became a reality.

With Roberto by his side, Terry made the journey to the nearest White Spot, travelling in his wheelchair. The trip took effort, and they paused for a couple of breaks along the way, but Terry's excitement was unmistakable. He was so happy he couldn't stop dancing in his chair, filled with anticipation for what lay ahead.

When they finally arrived and got settled in, Terry eagerly ordered his favourite meal—a Coca-Cola, a chicken burger, and french fries. As they ate, Terry and Roberto shared laughter and connection, joking about life, money, and

even driving. Terry spoke about his brother Bill, and the conversation flowed in a way that had been missing from his life for so long.

Terry enjoyed every bite of his meal with enthusiasm—so much so that crumbs covered his clothing. Roberto simply reassured him, smiling, “Don't worry about it—we're having a great time.” And that's exactly what they were having: a genuinely joyful moment, free from worry.

Afterward, they paid the bill and spent time outside together, reflecting on the day and reliving the highlights. It was a simple outing—but for Terry, it was life-changing. That one experience sparked something new.

Inspired and energized, Terry began to look ahead with curiosity and excitement. He expressed interest in joining an Individualized Supports group outing and visiting a bird sanctuary—new experiences that once felt out of reach.

In preparation, Terry has begun wearing his hearing aids, for the first time in many years. When he put them on, he was surprised and delighted that he could make out the sound of someone laughing, he was thrilled, this may mean he would be able to hear some of the sounds of the birds at sanctuary too!

At the same time, Terry is rediscovering another passion: painting. With growing confidence and support, he is re-engaging with his creativity and expressing himself in new ways.

Terry's life is changing. Where once there was isolation, there is now connection. Where there were limitations, there are now opportunities. With support, encouragement, and meaningful relationships, he is taking chances, exploring new interests, and embracing each new day. Most recently he went to Boston Pizza, his second favourite restaurant!

For the first time in a long time, Terry is not just living—he is truly experiencing life.

And he can't wait to see what the next chapter brings.

Successes in Employment Services

On May 11, 2026, two Job Seekers from CLS Employment Services took part in mock interviews at Mr. Pets. Lynn Stewart, the Manager of Mr. Pets in Port Coquitlam conducted the interviews and provided individualized feedback for each participant.

These mock interviews are invaluable, as they gave participants a real-world interview experience. Practising interview skills with a Job Coach is helpful, but having a mock interview with a real employer can have a profound effect on the person and really help with job skill development.

The feedback scoring was provided using these parameters:

- Professionalism
 - Qualities such as appearance, grooming, mannerism
- Engagement
 - Are they present?
 - Are they engaged in the conversation and asking questions?
- Communication
 - Do they appear to want the job or voice they want the job?
 - Do they seem interested in the interview/positions?

All Job Seekers were given interview questions ahead of time, researched Mr. Pets, and came well prepared with the support of their Job Coach who also brought them together to practice and provide peer feedback to one another.

Here are a few comments from the Job Seekers:

- Edward - I did find it helped very well for the mock interview and Mr. Pets Port Coquitlam was great!
- Abdul - Good Job, yes!
- Phoenix - I found the employer inspirational, and I found the mock interview very helpful.

They all did a great job, and the Job Coach will provide feedback to each of them individually.

Celebrating two years!

James recently celebrated his two-year anniversary as a shop hand at Kal Tire. Before this position he studied autobody and refinishing at Vancouver Community College and worked as a prep technician at Morita Autobody.

His daily tasks include loading and unloading delivery trucks; locating, organizing, and staging tires and parts for installation; and cleaning and other duties around the shop. At the beginning, James learned to distinguish tire brands and identify models approved for winter use. He also developed a strong understanding of safe work practices, including hand, eye, and ear protection, and the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS), through Kal Tire's safety programs.

James is hardworking and dependable and has never been late for work. Over the past few years, he has increased his confidence, built a strong, positive relationship with his team, and expanded his shifts to several days per week. James feels happy about working in an environment with friendly and supportive colleagues.

James's message to workers is:

**Be safe! Don't take risks.
Use common sense at work.**

When Jennifer stepped into the Team Lead role at Villa Rosa in August 2022, the home was in deep transition. Staff changes, shifting dynamics, and the overall instability that left the environment fragile and in need of steady, compassionate leadership. Over the next three years,



Jennifer quietly transformed the home. She led with calm confidence—listening deeply, supporting with empathy, and always keeping a vision for growth. She believed in the Supported Individual's potential and focused not only on meeting their daily needs but on helping them build fuller, more independent lives. Her approach, grounded in accountability and active support, helped them both flourish in ways once considered impossible: RV now has a paid job, and KM volunteers in the community.

Jennifer also built strong, trusting relationships with both families, making them true partners in the Supported Individuals' progress. At the same time, she nurtured a positive team culture—one where staff feel appreciated, connected, and proud of their work. Through creative touches like the “profile of the month,” thank-you boards, appreciation walls, birthday celebrations, and the playful “Livin' La Villa Rosa” shirts, she helped shape a team that laughs together, supports one another, and shows up united.

Today, Villa Rosa is a happier, more stable, more hopeful home—and much of that change can be traced back to Jennifer's steady, thoughtful leadership.

Community Integration and Inclusion Award

The Community Integration and Inclusion Award is presented to someone who consistently and significantly achieves success in a community inclusion and integration goal for an individual or group, specifically which engages them in a number of differing and creative ways.

She exemplifies CLS' Vision, Mission and Values, inspiring her team to do the same. Over the past year, she established a relationship with the newly formed

Surrey Police Department, involving community inclusion teams and homes. Notably, one constable has even learned American Sign Language (ASL) to better communicate with the people we support.

Criselda has continued initiatives like the Community Cupboard donation and the Community Garden project, building connections with local church groups to sustain these efforts. She actively includes the people she supports in community projects, adapting opportunities to meet their needs, while ensuring that active support practices are fully applied and their choices respected.

Active Support Award

This award is presented to a team or an employee who has demonstrated through multiple examples of sustained active supports, attitude and passion, a commitment and embracement of the Active Support philosophy and approach.



Ron Torres

Ron Torres is a dedicated advocate for the Kingsway Day Supports team, encouraging those he supports to lead independent lives. 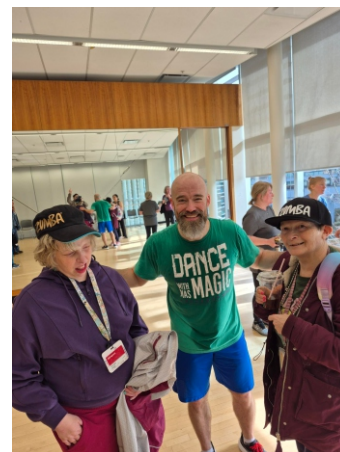

We completed our most recent City of Surrey Cultural Grant, which allowed us to continue offering free classes to community members who may not otherwise have the opportunity to participate, with a focus on supporting often overlooked and marginalized groups, helping to increase access to creative programming in a meaningful way. Two of the larger groups we were able to include were Let Her Talk (a peer support network for racialized self-identifying women and girls made by racialized women and girls), and Feather Circle (gatherings intended for wisdom sharing, mutual encouragement, and support towards reconciliation). We also collaborated with Discover Surrey in support of their Cherry Blossom themed events—a first of its kind. Participants created two cherry blossom dishes based on Stephanie's art pieces and were also provided with a cherry blossom designed cookie created by local bakery Cuppycakes. Our Saturday class schedule has become increasingly busy as regular weekday classes continue, with a noticeable increase in larger group take-home kit orders. We also hired a professional photographer for a studio photo shoot to capture updated headshots as well as group images for the team.

Mridu met with students from Frank Hurt Secondary School, who took on the assignment of building a mini library for our street, dividing into four teams to each design a library, with Mridu selecting the final piece to be installed. She received a generous donation from CUPE 402 to supply books for the project, with thanks also to Lyn Vera Lay, Artist-Educator, Community Connector, and Arts Coordinator, for making the connection with the school. Carrie also received another grant from the Neighbourhood Small Grants Network, which she plans to use once again to bring community members together to build and distribute care packages for those in need.

Community events and celebrations continued to be a strong focus, with Fatima hosting a vendor table at the SFU Hockey game, where the league provided CLS with complimentary

tickets and 50% of their 50/50 draw proceeds were donated to CLS. We also celebrated Lunar New Year with traditional games and treats thanks to Cheyenne and Eva, and supported Pink Shirt Day and artist James Groening, with the team wearing shirts he designed while sharing support on social media in standing up against bullying and promoting kindness. We participated in the annual anti-racism event hosted by PICS Society, where artists presented new and personally meaningful works, and Jill attended Herstory, the annual fundraising event hosted by the Downtown Eastside Women's Centre, where she donated another art piece—this year, a dreamcatcher—contributing to another successful event. Studio artisans also entered the Arts Council of Surrey juried arts competition – Arts 2026, with work by Fatima, Kurt, and Jill selected for exhibition, on display from May 9 to August 1.

Stephanie had her first volunteer shift with Vancouver Food Runners, an organization that helps rescue surplus food and support community programs. Over the last while Jarred has been creating and selling Métis and Indigenous inspired artwork with the intention of donating a portion of proceeds to Métis Family Services. He recently had the opportunity to deliver the first cheque along with a Métis flag dish, meeting with Juan Franco, Director of Program and Practice, receiving a tour, and being gifted a beautiful sash.

Unfortunately for the Newton Canadian Baseball Association, after 75 years they have had to close their doors, and as part of their wind-down process remaining funds were allocated by donation to non-profits and charities, with Studio Seventy Three being chosen as a recipient. It was a very generous donation, and we will share an update once we determine how best to use these funds.

We're grateful for the continued opportunities to connect with community, support meaningful initiatives, and share creative experiences with so many people.



Pottery Works

Traditionally, in commercial art studios, the New Year is a time of developing new products and techniques, getting ready for the next season of shows. After the busiest show season of our 26 years last year, PotteryWorks is following this tradition. For the past few months, we have been producing new work. The potters are busy developing new forms and glazes and the Colour Collective painters are developing on the skills that they learned last year.
